### The Transfiguration of one particular day!

I was deep in the throes of a busy Monday morning. Crazy one, really—for I had to “count some money”, answer phone calls, deal with one or two difficult e-mails, talk to staffmembers, etc. Time seemed tighter than ever—and then I got a call from Connecticut. The man said, haltingly, that a priest would be arriving at the Shrine soon with three young men (one was a seminarian). Would I kindly let them celebrate Mass there, maybe at the Kateri Chapel?? I called him back and said “no problem” hoping that my day would be full of only good interruptions like this, but worrying about the time. I asked the man when they’d arrive. He did not know. They “were on the road, and maybe coming soon.” That’s all he knew!

Rather soon, in fact, after I had gulped down a quick glass of juice, I met my quartet of visitors at the Visitor Center Gift Shop. The women there, as always, had been helpful in getting the right connections made. And suddenly, this young newly-ordained priest asked me a strange question (one we’ve not heard for years): Can we celebrate this Mass in the Ravine? Well, there is an altar there, and the rain seemed to have stopped—so naturally I said yes. I was wondering what the flies and their friends would be like, but he (the intrepid Father Henry) seemed oblivious to those, and he and the others prepared for their trip down. Meanwhile, I had to run fast to the Kateri chapel to get him some wine, some purificators, and a Crucifix. He had most of the other materials for Mass with him! (Let it never be said that a new padre is not always ready “for Mass on the road”!)

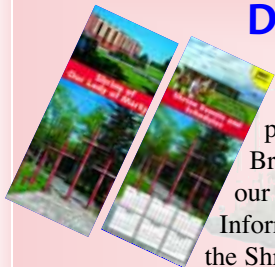
Later, as I left them and walked back up the last part of the hill, I thought: how wonderful it is! To find young people searching for saintly inspiration on this feast, the Transfiguration of the Lord. This young priest and his 3 companions were perhaps looking for their own mountaintop experience—and would no doubt find it in the holiest of places here at Auriesville, the Ravine. Where Rene was first buried and where Fr. Isaac walked, is now the place of grace, and healing, and hope! It reminds us that we are lucky to have such zealous supporters of Kateri and the Martyrs come to visit us!

And it was a blessing for me, too, on an otherwise forgettable Monday, to realize that “the three tents” that St. Peter wanted to build are always being built, by those who love the Trinity, and love our holy martyrs, and who travel many miles to celebrate a liturgy of thanks in our Ravine-cradled wilderness.

## Find it at the Shrine: Part 6

Many times over the course of the Shrine season, we are asked about certain statues, altars, historical buildings and structures that are dotted throughout the sacred grounds of the Shrine. Continuing this week's Pilgrim, we are introducing you to various parts of the Shrine with pictures and information that might help you find and learn about many areas of the Shrine and where they are located on the vast grounds here at Auriesville.

The series is titled "Find it at the Shrine" and we hope it will give you a better understanding of what is here and what its significance is, if you don't already know. It is being prepared by Dorothy Domkowski, a loyal supporter of the Shrine and a member of the Shrine Council.

We hope you will enjoy the series and find it beneficial on your visits to the Shrine of Our Lady of Martyrs.



### *Find it at the Shrine*

This ten-foot statue of St. Isaac Jogues was erected at the original gateway to the Shrine in 1922. It is a copy of a marble statue which was originally installed in the Dunwoodie Seminary. This statue, made of composite stone cement, was commissioned by the Order of Alhambra and created by the Joseph Sibel Studios.

### *Find it at the Shrine*

This chapel dedicated to the North American Martyrs was the second chapel constructed at the Shrine. Built in 1894, it was left open all around to permit throngs of pilgrims to hear Mass from the surrounding lawn. It served the Shrine until 1930 when the Coliseum was built. In 1984, it was renovated to include the Chapel of Kateri Tekakwitha. The names of both chapels adorn the front of the building.

## Pontiff Urges Christians to Defend Hope

Says This Is a Proclamation of the Faith (Zenit.org).- Benedict XVI says that evangelization in today's world implies following the example of the first Christians and combining proclamation with dialogue.

The Pope said this Tuesday during a question-and-answer session with 400 priests of the dioceses of Belluno-Feltre and Treviso, in the Church of St. Justina Martyr in Auronzo di Cadore, near Lorenzago di Cadore, where he is nearing the end of his vacation. One of the priests mentioned northern Italy, explaining that it is home for many immigrants and, therefore, a place of "respectful dialogue with other religions." The priest asked how to evangelize in this context.

The Holy Father recalled similar questions that arise in meetings with bishops from other parts of the planet, because "a homogeneous world no longer exists."

### Mustard Seed

"We live in a state of perpetual meeting, similar to that of the early Church, where the first Christians experienced the same situation,"

Benedict XVI said. "Christians were a very small minority, a mustard seed that began to grow, surrounded by different religions and living conditions.

"Therefore, we must learn from the experience of the first Christians. St. Peter in his first letter, in the third chapter, said: 'Always be ready to give an account of the hope that is within you.'

"In this way, he formulated for the average person at that time, for the normal Christian, the necessity to combine proclamation and dialogue. "He did not say formally: 'Proclaim the Gospel to everyone.' He said: 'You must be able, ready, to give an account of the hope that is within you.'"

The Pope called this the "necessary synthesis" between dialogue and proclamation. "In the first place we must have within us the reason for our hope," he affirmed. "We must be people who live faith and think about faith and know it interiorly. In this way faith becomes reason; it becomes reasonable. "Meditation on the Gospel and its proclamation, the homily, catechesis, rendering others capable of understanding the faith, these are all fundamental elements in this relationship between dialogue and proclamation."

### Neighbors

The Holy Father further emphasized the necessity of recognizing all people as neighbors. He urged living "love of our neighbor as an expression of our faith." "I think," he explained, "that this is already in itself a strong witness and a form of proclamation -- to live with others this love of neighbor, recognizing in them our neighbor, so that they can see: This 'love of neighbor' is for me."

"If this happens, we can more easily show them the root of our behavior, which is that this love of neighbor is an expression of our faith," the Pontiff said. "In dialogue we cannot move immediately to the great mysteries of the faith.

"Something practical and realizable, necessary, is above all to look for understanding about life's values, expressed in the Ten Commandments, summarized in love of God and neighbor, and therefore understandable in other areas of life."

The key, he concluded, is a "humble and patient proclamation, that waits, but that incarnates living our lives according to a conscience illuminated by God."

The story of the beloved patron of hopeless situations comes to life in this epic film starring Victoria Belvedere (Pope John Paul II, The Apocalypse) and Martin Crewes. ## Daily Prayer

Throughout this week, each of us can find the connection between some part of the readings and a desire, a need, a longing in our unique situation. If we begin each day - at the side of our beds, in the shower, while getting dressed, over a cup of coffee - simply talking with our Lord about our upcoming day, we will have a wonderfully reflective week. It doesn't have to be long. It just needs to be focused and focusing. That is, we need to keep uncovering something inside of us that we can talk with our Lord about, at various "in between" times during the day. Like a song that keeps playing in the back of our head all day, a desire we express in the morning will focus our day and our relationship with Jesus throughout the day. At night we can all pause to give thanks for times of connection with Jesus during the day, and the gifts God gives us.

This week, it might be Jesus' prediction of his passion, death and resurrection that unsettles us, as we realize he's calling us to follow him. So, I might examine and experience my resistance to following him in the ways that might cost me dearly. I might ask if it is the "price" of discipleship that deters me. And, who can't be opened up by the parable of the servant who doesn't forgive as he's been forgiven? Each day we might name people we struggle to forgive. We can remind ourselves each day of God's mercy toward me. We could make a focused effort to thank God for the mercy, compassion and unconditional love we've experienced, as ask for the grace to share that with others. For some of us, it will be important to spend a day or more asking for the grace to be faithful in our marriage - in all the ways that will call us to die to ourselves and think of the needs of our spouse before my own. Is my heart "hard" somehow? Can I ask for the grace of healing and a new softness, a new heart?

Finally, as we approach Sunday, we can ask our Lord to set our hearts on fire for service, for the needs of others, for sharing the Good News in our part of the world.
