Happy Mother's Day!

The origin of "Mothers' Day." Anna M. Jarvis (1864-1948) first suggested the national observance of an annual day honoring all mothers because she had loved her own mother so dearly. At a memorial service for her mother on May 10, 1908, Miss Jarvis gave a carnation (her mother's favorite flower) to each person who attended. Within the next few years, the idea of a day to honor mothers gained popularity, and Mothers' Day was observed in a number of large cities in the U.S. On May 9, 1914, by an act of Congress, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed the second Sunday in May as Mothers' Day. He established the day as a time for "public expression of our love and reverence for the mothers of our country." By then it had become customary to wear white carnations to honor departed mothers and red to honor the living, a custom that continues to this day. On Mothers' Day families pay special tribute to their moms in various ways--cards, flowers, breakfast in bed or at McDonald's, lunch at a fine restaurant, long distance calls, and special gifts. These are just some of the ways families will say thanks to mom, and that is as it should be. But too often Mothers' Day is simply a time when families attempt to atone for an entire year of neglect, indifference, misuse, disrespect, and a lack of thoughtfulness and genuine appreciation. How typical of modern society and how hypocritical!

Proverbs 31:10-31 presents us with God's description and estimation of what a godly wife and mother looks like. 1. She is a devoted wife (vss. 11, 12, 23). She is one who has the confidence of her husband, who seeks his welfare, and enhances his reputation. 2. She is a diligent partner (vss. 13-17, 18b, 19, 22, 24). As a woman with God's viewpoint, she is a willing worker, a wise shopper and a planner who is able to minister to her family because she keeps herself fit spiritually and physically (cf. vs. 18a, 25). 3. She is a dutiful servant to the needy and the poor (vs. 20). She has a vision for ministry not only to her family but to her society. 4. She is a dependable mother (vss. 15, 21, 27). She is devoted to the needs of her family. She is well groomed, attractive, organized, and disciplined and as such, is a testimony to her children. 5. She is a doctrinally oriented woman (vs. 26, 18). She is a woman full of God's wisdom. St. Paul exhorts husbands to love their wives as Christ loves the Church (Ephesians 6: 25). Husbands have the solemn duty to sacrifice themselves continually in their total love for their wives and their children. Each day provides numerous opportunities for husbands to live out their family life with many acts of patience, kindness and service. The most important thing a father can do for his children is to love their mother.

Message to Young Adults

The Preface from the Document
("Sons and Daughters of the Light")
written by The Catholic Bishops of
the US to young adults.

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

As we began to write this pastoral plan we chose first to meet with some of you. These meetings, where you shared the joys and struggles of your daily life, have been a time of grace and understanding for us. We applaud your desire to belong to a community that shares similar convictions and to learn more about sacred Scripture, tradition and the teachings of the Church. We acknowledge the pain many of you speak of in feeling unwelcome and alone—strangers in the house of God. For any failure to extend hospitality, we apologize and promise greater efforts to welcome you into church life. We hope that anyone who enters a catholic church for mass, or at any other time, will feel comfortable and welcome. We also acknowledge that some of you recently have joined the Church. We welcome you. Others of you may be tempted to leave. We regret this. What you have told us presents the Church with both a challenge and an opportunity for our ministry.

We know that your talents, and those of other young adults, can enrich the Church and can be a sign of God's presence in society. We invite you to share them with us and to become part of a welcoming community for other young adults as well. Not too long ago our Holy Father spoke of your importance to the life of the Church: "The Church needs your energies, your enthusiasm, your ideals, in order to make the Gospel of life penetrate the fabric of society, transforming people's hearts and the structures of society in order to create a civilization of true justice and love."¹

We also heard you speak of the difficulty in making moral decisions. We pledge to work with you to provide effective Catholic education and faith formation for you and other young adults. We want to share the Church's rich history and tradition with you. We want to provide opportunities for you to explore the Scriptures so the word of God becomes

alive in your hearts. It is not easy to live as a Christian in contemporary society

The influences of media and some elements of popular culture do not always support Christian values. People can have convictions that are opposed to what we cherish. We are challenged to let the Gospel, rather than society or popular culture, define what it means to live a successful life. We are also aware that many young adults are approached aggressively by various spiritual and religious movements that perceive our religion as inadequate or wrong. Probably some people with whom you work or go to college will challenge what you believe. Appreciate your faith. Stand firm in your beliefs. Help those who do not believe in Jesus Christ discover the beauty of a life based on the Gospel.

In a special way, we would like to speak to those men and women in difficult situations: to those who are unemployed or underemployed, who have been abused, who experience discrimination because of economic or ethnic prejudices, who struggle with their sexuality, who are newcomers to our country, who are struggling in their marriage, who seek wisdom and guidance in raising children, or who are having difficulty making and keeping commitments. We want you to know that you are not alone and that we will continue our efforts to listen to your concerns and speak on your behalf, offering you a hope rooted in the embrace of Jesus Christ.

During your life journey, continue to hope and to dream. We want to support you in every way we can, even as we acknowledge that this support has not always been present. This is one of the works of the Christian community—to help you live your life in Jesus Christ. Do not hesitate to make Jesus the center of your life, the focus of your choices in life. In the words of our Holy Father, "Build your lives on the one model that will not deceive you . . . open the Gospel and discover that Jesus Christ wants to be your 'friend' (cf. Jn 15:14). He wants to be your 'companion' at every stage on the road of life (cf. Lk 24:13-35). He wants to be the 'way,' your path through

the anxieties, doubts, hopes and dreams of happiness (cf. Jn 14:6). He wants to be your God (cf. Mt 16:13-17)."²

We would like to share with you the words of one of your peers, a young woman who wrote to us from New York. She sums up what so many of you have told us and how we hope the Church can be present in your lives.

As a young adult in today's dynamic society, I—like so many other young adults—am

hungry. I have felt a strong spiritual hunger, a hunger that stems from the need to discover who I am, who is my God, and what is my purpose in society. It is a hunger that once fed can continue to fuel my life journey in a direction that would follow the footsteps of Christ.

It is my hope that the Catholic Church will help guide me through this transitional period of my life; to keep me in touch with the "big picture" of life while I strive to pursue both my immediate and distant dreams; to help me find peace along the way. It is also my hope that the Catholic Church will provide us, as young adults, with the opportunities to truly feel an integral and necessary part of the church community; to provide us the chance to gather with other young adults so that we may share and reflect on our life journey and self-discovery together.

I believe that through a community of encouragement and support based on the life and teachings of Christ, the Catholic Church can give me the inspiration, strength, and perseverance necessary to continue my journey and to realize my hopes and dreams for life.

As I begin my sixth Shrine season here at Auriesville, I long to be able to feel the breezes more, to notice friendly faces more often, and "slow down" enough most days to smell the roses (or newly-cut grass) and more often. I hope and pray I'll hear the sound of children playing on our grounds, and see the sight of picnicking pilgrims, even more than last year. I yearn to be able to enter the Coliseum church with greater joy, and attend staff morning prayer more generously than last year, because I know Someone greater than I stands in charge of this holy place.

My job is not so tough that, most days, I would trade it for another; I would not. I know my successes as the director are usually due in good part to the labor and dedication of others around me; likewise, I know that my failures, though essentially my own, are often the product of mistaken zeal or pressures from someone who did not see the larger picture, or from plain laziness. My hope is that the Shrine can do more good for more souls than ever before--but this is in the hands of God, and not mine. For we move in a kind of semi-darkness, we pilgrims, and as Saint Paul said, "We see in a mirror, dimly." One day, we shall see God "face to face." (I Cor. 13, St. Paul), but till then, we have to try to "serve God in the tangle of our minds." That line comes from *A Man for All Seasons* (the movie). I think it would behoove us to use it freely at the start of our own season, here on the Hill above the Mohawk.

Thoughts on... "Slow Me Down, Lord"

Having read the above prayerful message on the need for quiet, silence and being in touch with nature and God, I had a very contrasting humorous incident told to me by a friend.

He said that he met two young vivacious college girls on a certain unidentified campus who were walking together and both were speaking on their cell phones. That may be sad but almost common except that they were talking to one another! When asked by this shocked friend, they said, reasonably enough, that they started the conversation on opposite sides of the campus and they did not want to interrupt the train of thought.

This image of cell phone captivation gave me a rather bizarre thought that we are developing a most nervous system outside our bodies which is electronic. Have we moved into a whole new world of personal and globalized intimacy that can either unite us or destroy us?

I suppose you are not old enough like me to remember a certain Marshall McLuhan. He wrote a book called, "The Medium is the Message," way back in 1967.

In this book he wrote: "The medium, or process, of our time— electronic technology — is reshaping and restructuring patterns of social interdependence and every aspect of our personal life. The new electronic interdependence recreates the world in the image of a global village. It is forcing us to reconsider and reevaluate practically every thought, every action, and every institution formerly taken for granted. Everything is changing — you, your family, your neighborhood, our education, your job, your government, your relation to 'the others' and they're changing dramatically."

Now remember that Dr. McLuhan was captivated with the media world of television and cinema. He had not the slightest inkling of the even more revolutionary dimension of the computer and internet of Yahoo or Google.

Back to the beauty of that previous reflection of quietude. What is the Holy Spirit saying to the Churches? Should we put the cell phones on "vibrate" and walk together? Do you think that those two vivacious girls were thinking about the Holy Spirit and even Marshall McLuhan?

I hope that the above will get you back to your prayers. Maybe we can talk about these thoughts again.

Daily Prayer This Week

Nothing can separate us from the love of God. We may want to hide from it or we might feel unworthy of that love, but it is ours anyways. The message Jesus offers us this week is the image of the vine and the branches - intertwined, growing together and inseparable. We have not earned God's love nor can we. It is freely offered to us and our lives would change if we could really believe it and accept it. If we really believed in that great gift of God's love to us, we wouldn't be worried about how much we have, how successful we are or compare ourselves to others. We could forgive more easily and forget hurts more readily.

This week is a wonderful week to ask for help to accept that endless love from our Lord. Each morning as we awake, we can pause at the side of our bed and open our hands, in the traditional pose of a supplicant. "Lord, help me to accept what I might struggle with accepting - your love. Help me to open my heart to you today more fully and to be more loving and compassionate to those you put into my life."

That tiny prayer may make it easier to face my day with its conflicts and confusion. During the day when our culture offers me the empty "satisfaction" of buying more, drinking more, eating more, I can open my hands again and ask for the grace to be guided in all my decisions. When I am tempted to let my feeling sbe hurt over petty or imagined slights or pout because others can't read my mind, I can open my hand and heart again to our Lord and remember how loved and cherished I am.

As we go through each day and find ourselves facing the challenges of our world, our families our lives, we can ask again to remember the hand of Jesus on our shoulder saying, "Peace be with you. Do not be troubled or afraid." It is that peace, that miraculous love, that will change our hearts and lives in ways nothing else can.
