Movie Reviews for Young Adults

FIREHOUSE DOG (A-2, PG): Rex is a pampered canine celebrity who accidentally falls out of a plane while shooting a commercial. He lands in a truckload of tomatoes and loses his hairpiece. Unrecognizable, Rex is carried away into the city, where a firefighter named Connor Fahey (Bruce Greenwood, *Racing Stripes*) rescues the lost pooch and takes him home. Connor and his son, Shane (Josh Hutcherson, *Bridge to Terabithia*, *RV*), have a strained relationship: Shane's mom left when he was a toddler, and recently his uncle died with the firehouse mascot in a suspicious blaze. Rex is renamed "Dewey." He adapts to life at the fire station, including the Spam soup created by firefighter Joe (Bill Nunn, *Sister Act*). The future of the station is threatened by a mysterious series of fires. Dewey saves the day, the firehouse and a family. *Firehouse Dog* is entertaining, even if it is formulaic. There are some intense scenes that make it more appealing to young adolescents than small children, yet the dog's antics (including the requisite canine farts) cut across generational lines. I enjoyed the faux funeral Rex's owner had for him because the fast-food Chihuahua and insurance company duck were in attendance. Television director Todd Holland (*Malcolm in the Middle*, *Felicity*) helmed this fun family-values flick that won't make it on anyone's best-film list. Some problem language and peril.

YEAR OF THE DOG (A-3, PG-13): Peggy (Molly Shannon) is a 40-ish unmarried secretary. She lives quietly with her beloved dog, Pencil, who dies after being accidentally poisoned by a neighbor (John C. Reilly, *Chicago*). Peggy grows fond of Newt (Peter Sarsgaard, *Garden State*), an SPCA worker, at the same time she becomes a vegan and a PETA activist. She alienates her family when she takes a niece to an animal-rescue ranch. Peggy's boss, Robin (Josh Pais), is boring, a reflection of Peggy's life. This not-quite-a-comedy from writer/director Mike White (*The School of Rock*) is about a woman on the verge of finding meaning in her otherwise dull life. On the surface, Peggy is ordinary. But she discovers through trial and error that there are all kinds of ways of loving in the world. Anyone who has ever lost a beloved pet will empathize with the lonely Peggy. Molly Shannon, of *Saturday Night Live* fame, shows considerable talent playing her role with restraint and heart. Mild profanity and sexual innuendo.

DISTURBIA (A-3, PG-13): Shia LaBeouf (*Holes*, *Bobby*) plays Kale, a high school student who is sentenced to house arrest and must wear an ankle monitor for the summer because he hit a teacher. In a modern version of Alfred Hitchcock's *Rear Window*, Kale and his girlfriend watch the neighbors and become suspicious of one in particular. LaBeouf is excellent. His adolescent attempts at housekeeping and efforts at romance will make this hero appealing to teens. Intense crime thriller and a good watch; some crude language.

BLADES OF GLORY (A-3; PG-13) Will Ferrell (*Talladega Nights: The Ballad of Ricky Bobby*, *Stranger Than Fiction*) and Jon Heder (*Napoleon Dynamite*) play opponents who become the first male skating pair so they can compete in the Olympics after being disqualified as single skaters because of brawling. Ferrell is uncouth and Heder more refined. Ferrell's act of friendship does little to save this lowbrow buddy film.

Decline of Mom-and-Pop Families Kids Left Behind as Parenthood is Refined

NEW YORK, SEPT. 30, 2006 (*Zenit.org*)- Family structures and parenthood roles are being redefined without sufficient consideration for the needs of children. This is the warning of a report just published that describes worldwide trends in family law and reproductive technology.

"The Revolution in Parenthood: The Emerging Global Clash Between Adult Rights and Children's Needs" is published by the Commission on Parenthood's Future. The commission "is an independent, nonpartisan group of scholars and leaders," active in the area of the family, according to a press release on the Web site of the Institute for American Values. The New York-based institute is one of the organizations behind the commission.

The author of the report is Elizabeth Marquardt, a member of the commission and author of the book, "Between Two Worlds: The Inner Lives of Children of Divorce."

The report finds that worldwide trends in law and reproductive technologies are redefining parenthood in ways that put the interests of adults before the needs of children. "The two-person mother-father model of parenthood," it states, "is being changed to meet adults' rights to children rather than children's needs to know and be raised, whenever possible, by their mother and father."

The revolution in parenthood described in the publication comprises a variety of issues: high divorce rates; single-parent childbearing; the growing use of egg and sperm donors; support for same-sex marriage; and proposals to allow children conceived with the use of sperm and egg donors to have three legal parents.

A legal revolution

The report gives a number of examples of far-reaching legal changes in families, often introduced with a minimum of debate.

In Canada the law allowing same-sex marriage also included a provision that eliminated the term "natural parent" in federal law, replacing it with "legal parent." With that law, the focus of power in defining who a child's parents are shifts precipitously from civil society to the state, with the consequences as yet unknown.

In Spain, shortly after the legalization of same-sex marriage, the government changed the format of birth certificates for all children. In the future they will read "Progenitor A" and "Progenitor B," instead of "mother" and "father."

In India guidelines on assisted reproductive technology issued in June 2005 state that a child born through the use of donated sperm or eggs will not have any right to know the identity of the genetic parents.

Pressure for other, more radical, changes is also under way.

In New Zealand and Australia, law commissions have proposed allowing children conceived with use of sperm or egg donors to have three legal parents. The proposals fail to address what would happen if the three parents break up and feud over the child.

There is increasing support from influential legal commissions and legal scholars in Canada and the United States for the legalization of group marriage arrangements such as polygamy and polyamory, which involves intimate relationships of three or more people.

In Ireland a commission on human reproduction proposed that couples who commission a child through a surrogate mother should automatically be the legal parents of the child, leaving the woman who delivers the baby with no legal standing or protection should she change her mind.

France is one of the few countries resisting the rush to change family law. A parliamentary report on the family and the rights of children, issued last January, stated that "the desire for a child seems to have become a right to a child."

The French report also recommended not legalizing same-sex marriage. Among the reasons it gave was concern about the identity and development of children when the law creates a situation in which there are "two fathers, or two mothers - which is biologically neither real nor

plausible." The parliamentary report insisted on the need for a medical justification for assisted procreation, and that the ban on surrogacy should stand.

Adults first

In "Revolution in Parenthood" author Marquardt explains that the changes in parenthood and family structures are leading to clash between children's and parent's interests. "This redefinition," she warns, "increasingly emphasizes adults' rights to children rather than children's needs to know and be raised, whenever possible, by their mother and father."

"A good society protects the interests of its most vulnerable citizens, especially children," Marquardt's report contends. But the core institution of parenthood is being fundamentally redefined, often in a way that orients it primarily around adults' rights.

A common thread in many of the changes is an alleged "right to a child." The desire for a child is indeed "a powerful force felt deep in the soul," admits Marquardt, and the inability to bear a child of one's own is often felt as an enormous loss. "But," she adds, "the rights and needs of adults who wish to bear children are not the only part of the story."

Adoption has long been available for parents unable to bear children. But the use of assisted reproduction methods has transformed the situation, leading to the deliberate separation of children from their biological mothers and fathers. Biology is obviously not everything, the report notes, but at the same time it does matter.

Family structures are also crucial for children. Studies on the lives of children of divorce show enormous negative consequences for them, not sufficiently considered when no-fault divorce was introduced.

The first generation of donor-conceived children are now reaching adulthood. They were mainly conceived by married heterosexual couples using donor sperm. Marquardt cites a number of cases where the children are now speaking out about the powerful impact on their identity when adults purposefully conceive a child with the clear intention of separating that child from a biological parent. The young people often say they were denied the birthright of being raised by or at least knowing about their biological fathers.

Parenthood is Refined

In fact, many of these teenagers and adults are now forming organizations and are using the Internet to try to contact their sperm donors and find half siblings conceived with the same sperm.

Consent

One issue raised by the offspring of donor children is that the informed consent of the most vulnerable party, the child, is not obtained in reproductive technology procedures that intentionally separate children from one or both of their biological parents.

"Revolution in Parenthood" observes that in recent decades a powerful consensus among social scientists has emerged about the benefits of marriage for children. The current redefinition of parenthood, the report says, is reshaping culture and legal systems "in ways that contribute to further deep uncertainties in the meanings of fatherhood and motherhood."

For example, in the United States at least 10 states allow someone with no biological or adoptive relationship to a child, and no marital relationship to a child's parent, to be assigned parental rights and responsibilities as a psychological or de facto parent.

"In law and culture, the two-natural-parent, mother-father model is falling away, replaced with the idea that children are fine with any one or more adults being called their parents, so long as the appointed parents are nice people," the report comments.

These changes will have far-reaching consequences for the family, children and society. "Those of us who are concerned," concludes the report, "can and should take up and lead a debate about the lives of children and the future of parenthood."

Pope John Paul II and Cinema

In this issue of the Pilgrim, we conclude the 4 part series prepared by Fr. George Restrepo, S. J. on Pope John Paul II and Cinema.

Pope John Paul II's reflections on Cinema on November 19, 1998 to the International Study Conference on the Cinema.

"Cinematography, however, must never dominate man and life by subordinating them to artistic creation. Scientific progress has opened to the cinema horizons un hoped for until a short time ago, enabling images to surpass, both in

good and evil, the other products of human invention and to capture the audience's attention and wonder. At the same time, tempted to become an end in itself, the cinema has sometimes ended up losing contact with reality and the positive values of life. How frequently its images destroy the human being, defiling and obliterating his humanity, becoming a vehicle of degradation instead of growth! No one knows this better than you; the cinema cannot fully express itself without a clear and constant reference to the moral values and goals for which it came into being. It is up to those who work in the field, using their skill and experience, to explore the cinema's positive meaning, helping set designers, producers, and actors to become, by their talent and imagination, heralds of civilization and peace, of hope and solidarity; in a word, heralds of authentic humanity."

"I sincerely hope that those who work in the film industry will feel they have a great duty to promote an authentic humanism. I invite Christians to take responsibility for working with them in this vast artistic and professional undertaking to defend and promote the true values of human life. This is a valuable service which they render to the task of the new evangelization in view of the third millennium."

At the end of his talk, Pope John Paul II invoked upon his audience "an abundance of the Holy Spirit's gifts". Pope Pius XI., Pope Pius XII, Pope Paul VI, and Pope John Paul II were convinced of the power of the cinema which can be used for good or evil. I urge a growth in knowledge of the great films of the past, the silent films and the films of the 20's through the 50's and 60's, etc. Great classics exist in the world of foreign films. Why see films that will always leave you empty? Do not fill your mind with films that basically are not

worth seeing. Parents should be aware of the kind of films that are popular but not good for children. Be aware of what is good. Become film and TV literate!
