Insights for the Spiritual Journey: Part 2 of 3

I spoke in the last Pilgrim issue (June 24th issue) about the need we have to reflect on the wise principle that Ignatius of Loyola (a Basque saint, and founder of the Society) gave to the world, which he called the "Foundation and First Principle." It is used to kick off his **Spiritual Exercises**. These are, as every retreatant comes to realize, simply various Exercises of prayer, fasting etc. whereby one learns to rid the soul of disordered affections and tendencies. . . . It takes a lifetime to "live out" these Exercises, but every Jesuit learns early in his training that he will be drawing from them his whole life, and so, one also learns not to "rush" the Holy Spirit. God's timing is not ours; we cannot, and must not, run ahead of grace, if we wish to make true progress in the spirit-journey.

Ignatian Exercises are basically divided into four weeks. These are not to be seen as "seven-day weeks" but as variable times of growth, corresponding to four phases or stages for the interior life. The **First Week** contains meditations on sin, and the first sin; death, judgment and mercy. The Spirit urges the soul to go from a sinful life to a cleansed one; or, as would be the case for some retreatants, to go from a good life to a better one.

The **Second Week** focuses the retreatant on the person of Christ, who is Our Way, Truth and Life. We are urged to gaze at this wondrous Life in all of its humanity; to look at his birth, his childhood, his public life and ministry, and to find out how to know Him better, to serve Him more lovingly and to follow Him more faithfully. It's a tall order, but various key "considerations" are presented that often bring the retreat-maker into a pathway of immense consolation and grace.

The retreatant should always recall that God is lovingly and even intimately present with him (her) as he makes these meditations, or prays with the Gospel stories. He invites us to know the presence of God in human circumstances, and teaches us by His life to value the seemingly insignificant moments and events of our multi-faceted everyday existence.

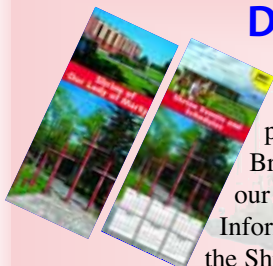
One of Saint Ignatius' classic or key reflections is called that of "**The Two Standards.**" We first are invited to picture Christ as Lord of peace, kindness and humility; giving a summons, or Call, which is truly honorable, and apostolically noble; and then, to envision Satan "on his throne of fire and smoke." Satan gives a call which is diametrically opposed to all that Jesus stands for. He orders his followers to seek riches, pride, and yearning for power which is self-centered and mean. Jesus calls his followers, however, to a life of service, humility and kindly awareness of others. It may lead them to the Cross (it always will, for followers of this Leader) but it will be under a banner of love and fidelity that they fight their battle against the forces of Evil that roam throughout our universe.

In the next issue, we will look at the **third and fourth weeks** of the Exercises, and, finally, try to explore together what "finding God in all things" might mean. Till then, may I urge you to an increase in your prayer-time? Then perhaps you will happily learn more about God's vision of life as discovered so many years ago by a Basque nobleman from Spain.

Find it at the Shrine

In 1885, the year of the first organized pilgrimage to Auriesville, this little chapel was built. It housed a small altar where the first Masses on the rediscovered site of Osserenon were celebrated. Restoration of the chapel is a current project of the Knights of Columbus.

This rustic pergola stands in the ravine and houses a statue of Our Lady of Martyrs to whom the Auriesville Shrine is dedicated. It is the oldest statue on the Shrine grounds.

On Birth of John the Baptist

"The First 'Witness' of Jesus"

VATICAN CITY (Zenit.org).- Here is a translation of the address Benedict XVI delivered today before reciting the midday Angelus with several thousand people gathered in St. Peter's Square.

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Today, June 24, the liturgy invites us to celebrate the solemnity of the Nativity of St. John the Baptist, whose life was totally oriented toward Christ, as was the life of Christ's mother, Mary.

John the Baptist was the precursor, the "voice" sent to announce the Incarnate Word. For this reason, to commemorate the birth of John the Baptist in reality means to celebrate Christ, the fulfillment of the promises of all the prophets, of whom John was the greatest, called to "prepare the way" before the Messiah (cf. Matthew 11:9-10).

All the Gospels begin the narrative of Jesus' public life with the account of the Jesus' baptism in the Jordan by John. St. Luke sets John's appearance on the scene in a solemn historical frame. My book "Jesus of Nazareth" also takes cues from Jesus' baptism in the Jordan, an event that had enormous resonance at that time.

From Jerusalem and from every part of Judea people came to listen to John the Baptist and be baptized by him in the river, confessing their sins (cf. Mark 1:5). The fame of the baptizer grew to such an extent that many asked whether he might be the Messiah. But John -- the Gospel writer emphasizes -- resolutely denied it: "I am not the Christ" (John 1:20).

Nevertheless, he is still the first "witness" of Jesus, having received instruction about him from heaven: "The man on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain is he who will baptize in the Holy Spirit" (John 1:33). This happened precisely when Jesus, having received baptism, came out of the water: John saw the Spirit descend on him like a dove.

It was then that he "knew" the full reality of Jesus of Nazareth and began "to make it known to Israel" (John 1:31), naming him as Son of God and redeemer of man: "Behold the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world" (John 1:29).

As an authentic prophet, John bore witness to the truth without compromise. He denounced transgressions of God's commandments, even when the protagonists were people in power. Thus, when he accused Herod and Herodius of adultery, he paid for it with his life, sealing with martyrdom his service to Christ, who is the truth in person.

Let us call on his intercession together with that of Mary Most Holy so that the Church of our time will know how to be ever faithful to Christ and testify with courage to his truth and his love for all.

[After praying the Angelus, the Holy Father greeted pilgrims in six languages. In Italian, he said:]

This Sunday, which proceeds the solemnity of Sts. Peter and Paul, is in Italy the Pope's Charity Day. My dear Italian faithful, I am deeply grateful for the prayer and support by which you participate in the evangelization and charitable work of the Successor of Peter throughout the world.

I offer a warm welcome to all the English-speaking pilgrims and visitors gathered for this Angelus prayer. Today, as the Church celebrates the Birth of Saint John the Baptist, let us ask for the gift of true conversion and growth in holiness, so that our lives will prepare a way for the Lord and hasten the coming of his Kingdom. Upon all of you I invoke God's blessings of joy and peace!

Interfaith Understanding

Fr. Jim Sheehan, a friend of this Shrine and the Jesuits here, will be visiting us later in July. He is a New York priest, working as a prison ministry chaplain, teacher, and author of the book "The Father Who Did Not Know My Name." (It's for Sale now in our Shrine gift shop!) Fr. Jim is quite sensitive and wise in his dealings with those of other world

religions (which he has taught also). He will speak on Thursday, July 19th after the 4 pm Mass with the topic: "Saint Francis and the Buddha—Kindred Souls!" It is important to me that we offer some teachings on Interfaith Dialog here at the Shrine, and Fr. Jim is a great man for this. This first of two talks on the overall subject will be our modest contribution to dialog and understanding.

A Note About Parish Envelopes

Everyone who comes to this Shrine is special to us. When you come to worship with us, we are genuinely blessed by your presence. When we pray together, we are all doubly blessed. There are many pilgrims who journey long distances to share in the graces bestowed on these hallowed grounds. But many, too, are from local communities. And we are equally happy to host all those from both near and afar.

When worshippers come from local parishes, they often bring their offertory envelopes from their own parish churches. We are happy to collect and mail these envelopes back to their respective parishes about once a month. It is our honest hope, too, that while something for another parish is dropped in the collection at Masses here, that the Shrine is offered something as well.

Unlike a parish community, where parishioners often pledge their support, the Shrine is really at the mercy (and the grace) of whomever stops by and is moved to provide a freewill offering. We do not charge an "admission" or a "parking fee;" we do not require specific compensation for special services or mini-retreats. Yet we need to hire many workers: fields need to be mowed, repairs are always being needed, tours are requested, religious articles need to be blessed, the Pilgrim needs to get published every week in season, etc., etc. We depend on the kindness of friends and strangers alike; and we are ever grateful for their generosity. It is what keeps this Shrine alive!

'Pilgrim' walks to spread message

George Walter is both a pilgrim and a hermit. He has logged 38,000 miles on foot, walking to spread the message of God's love over the past 37 years. Walter's life journey has taken him to 41 countries and 24 states. He has no experience and depends on the largesse of those he encounters. People invite him into their homes for dinner and buy him groceries in supermarkets. Walter's robe is literally a patchwork, swatches of light blue denim he stitched together. A thick white rope serves as a belt. His sandals are made from tire rubber. "I just trust in God to provide for me day by day," he said.

Growing up, Walter spent eight years in Catholic school and 12 years in seminary in his native Pennsylvania and in Ohio. But when he completed his studies, he didn't feel he was ready to be ordained with the rest of his class. Walter, who spent a couple of days at the Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha Shrine in Fonda this week and is now in Auriesville, recalled his 1967 conversation with the bishop: "I have all the knowledge but my faith is weak." The bishop suggested he take a year off. "So I dropped out," he said during an interview at the Kateri Shrine on Wednesday. He said one morning in 1968, while living near Boulder, Colo, he looked at the Rocky Mountains and realized that man wasn't responsible for the beautiful landscape: God was.

"That was the first time in my life I knew God was real," he said. Walter said he decided to make a pilgrimage to Jerusalem, to walk where Jesus did. In 1970, he boarded where Jesus did. In 1970, he boarded a freighter in New Orleans and it took him to Barcelona, Spain. One year and 4,000 miles later he arrived in the Holy Land. There, he said, God spoke to him: "This pilgrimage is over, but you will be a pilgrim for the rest of your life." Since then, he has been walking for God, spreading this message: "God loves you very much, and if you open your heart to his love you will have peace now and forever."

Tuesday afternoon, with severe thunderstorms closing in, Walter pitched his tent near Reservoir Road, just a few miles from the shrine and the comfort of its retreat house. Walter said he used a purifying filter to get a drink from a creek, and then used the creek to take a bath. HE said the violent storms that rolled in later were not a concern. "I was in my tent." Walter has a Website and often stops along his route to check his e-mail at a library. He also relies on the Internet for his maps.

"I tell people: I'm not no-tech, I'm low-tech. I don't carry a cellphone or a laptop, but I'm not averse to using them," he said. Walter, who will turn 66 next month, said he is not affiliated with any particular order. "My bishop said I'm an order of one," he laughed. "A pilgrim has to be alone. If you have more than one then you have a community and a whole different dynamic," he added. Walter has spent the last six winters near his hometown of Pittsburgh. "Eight months I'm a pilgrim. I walk May, June, July, August," he said.

When he's not walking, Walter said, he prays and reads the Bible cover to cover. He also pens a report on his latest trek and plans the next one. And Walter catches up on his correspondence. He said he receives hundreds of letters and e-mails from people he has encountered on his journeys who want to keep in touch. The Rev. Kevin Kenn, director of the Kateri Shrine, marveled at Walter's way of life. "he just walks all around the world. Incredible," Kenny said.

"It gives witness to the passing things in this world," he continued. "We're all pilgrims headed to another place, and that's what religious orders are supposed to be about. We're to transit to something bigger and better."

Pope Benedict's Pilgrimage Driver 10 Commandments

Seeing that the majority of younger and older adult Americans tend to be driving every day and seeing that some of the drivers might be making a Pilgrimage this summer, I thought that the following could bring up worthwhile conversations when we might consider, while driving, that it was time to pray.

1. You shall not kill.
2. The road shall be for you a means of communion between people and not of mortal harm.
3. Courtesy, uprightness and prudence will help you deal with unforeseen events.
4. Be charitable and help your neighbor in need, especially victims of accidents.
5. Cars shall not be for you an expression of power and domination, and an occasion of sin.
6. Charitably convince the young and not so young not to drive when they are not in a fitting condition to do so.
7. Support the families of accident victims.
8. Bring guilty motorists and their victims together, at the appropriate time, so that they can undergo the liberating experience of forgiveness.
9. On the road protect the more vulnerable party.
10. Feel responsible toward others.
