### Weekend Mass Attendance: Obligation or Love of God?

Those of us who cut our Catholic teeth on the Baltimore Catechism are certainly familiar with the mandate to attend weekend Mass. Many of us who were brought up in the faith recall the Sunday morning family ritual of getting up, putting on our "Sunday best" and going to church, where mindful parents monitored our behavior.

Over time, hopefully our rote actions take on deeper meaning. As we became old enough to take ourselves to church, it would be because we developed a deeper understanding of the "sacrifice" of the Mass, an appreciation of the love of Jesus for us manifested by giving his life for us on the cross and thereby making salvation possible, but also by creating the sacrament by which he continues to give himself to us, body and blood, in the Eucharist that we receive at Mass. Our redemption is ongoing...a truly powerful concept that seems to take a lifetime to begin to comprehend.

As adults, maybe we come to value what going to Mass actually does for us. Perhaps it affects our spirituality...some homily tidbit, a lesson in the readings, or a phrase from a song...that resonates through the week or pops into our mind when we least expect, but most need it.

When we take the time to focus our thoughts, we absolutely KNOW how dependant we are on God for our very lives and all the blessings we need to get through each day. But mostly, we don't focus on that...until we get into trouble. We wake up to feel a lump that wasn't there the day before, we get a phone call to hear our best friend was in a car accident...and our first response, our first audible remark is "Oh, my God!" Yes, it is definitely God, first and foremost, to whom we turn because only He can make miracles happen.

And so, each weekend, we carve out an hour...and often it's far less than that...to praise and thank God for all that He does to sustain us, express our contrition for offenses, and take the opportunity to ask for His help in all the troubled areas of our lives; but so often, so many of us...don't even stay through the end of the Mass! Right from receiving the Eucharist, we're marching out the door. Heaven forbid that we should be detained by traffic in the church parking lot! Where do we have to go? What do we have to do that is so precious that we cannot stay ten extra minutes to focus on Jesus in our hearts and wait for the blessing at the end of the Mass that allows us to go forward taking Him with us into our week's journey?

Let us take the grace of this moment, right now, to resolve to give God ten minutes more than we've given Him in the past. It's quite possible that in doing so, we may just notice His intervention in our daily lives a bit more clearly and see His smile in the eyes of those we meet along the way.

## Find it at the Shrine: Part 10

We hope it will give you a better understanding of what is here and what its significance is, if you don't already know. It is being prepared by Dorothy Domkowski, a loyal supporter of the Shrine and a member of the Shrine Council.

We hope you will enjoy the series and find it beneficial on your visits to the Shrine of Our Lady of Martyrs.



### *Find it at the Shrine*

It was a tradition at the Shrine for pilgrims to make the Stations of the Cross during their visits. The sculptured stations are finely detailed and framed in brick settings. They begin at the Martyrs Chapel, extend along Shrine paths, and end at the Hill of Prayer that rises gently to the south.

### *Find it at the Shrine*

Designed by Frances Serber in 1963, this Crucifix in ceramic tile hangs in the north window of the Visitor's Center. It is 6 feet in length and is composed of 6' x 6' tiles in red and white. The figure is Christ the King clothed in kingly garments wearing a crown on the head. The Crucifix was a gift from the artist.

## Mother Teresa's Dark Night Unique, Says Preacher

Father Cantalamessa Calls Her Saint of the Media Age

(Zenit.org).- Blessed Mother Teresa of Calcutta's dark night of the soul kept her from being a victim of the media age and exalting herself, says the preacher of the Pontifical Household.

Capuchin Father Raniero Cantalamessa said this in an interview with Vatican Radio, commenting on previously unpublished letters from Mother Teresa, now made public in Doubleday's book "Mother Teresa: Come Be My Light," edited by Father Brian Kolodiejchuk, postulator of the cause of Mother Teresa's canonization.

In one of her letters, Mother Teresa wrote: "There is so much contradiction in my soul. Such deep longing for God -- so deep that it is painful -- a suffering continual -- and yet not wanted by God -- repulsed -- empty -- no faith -- no love -- no zeal. Souls hold no attraction. Heaven means nothing -- to me it looks like an empty place."

Father Cantalamessa explained that the fact that Mother Teresa suffered deeply from her feeling of the absence of God affirms that it was a positive phenomenon. Atheists, he contended, are not afflicted by God's absence but, "for Mother Teresa, this was the most terrible test that she could have experienced."

He further clarified that "it is the presence-absence of God: God is present but one does not experience his presence."

### Martyrdom

Father Cantalamessa contended that Mother Teresa's spiritual suffering makes her even greater.

He said: "The fact that Mother Teresa was able to remain for hours in front of the Blessed Sacrament, as many eye-witnesses have testified, as if enraptured ... if one thinks about the condition she was in at that moment, that is martyrdom!"

Because of this, for me, the figure of Mother Teresa is even greater; it does not diminish her."

The Capuchin priest further lauded Mother Teresa's ability to keep her spiritual pain hidden within her. "Maybe, this was done in expiation for the widespread atheism in today's world," he said, adding that she lived her experience of the absence of God "in a positive way -- with faith, with God."

Not scandalous Father Cantalamessa affirmed that Mother Teresa's dark night should not scandalize or surprise anyone. The "dark night," he said, "is something well-known in the Christian tradition; maybe new and unheard of in the way Mother Teresa experienced it."

He added: "While 'the dark night of the spirit' of St. John of the Cross is a generally preparatory period for that definitive one called 'unitive,' for Mother Teresa it seems that it was one stable state, from a certain point in her life, when she began this great work of charity, until the end."

In my view, the fact of this prolongation of the 'night' has meaning for us today. I believe that Mother Teresa is the saint of the media age, because this 'night of the spirit' protected her from being a victim of the media, namely from exalting herself."

In fact, she used to say that when she received great awards and praise from the media, she did not feel anything because of this interior emptiness."

## Sons and Daughters of the Light

### Part Two: The Young Adult

#### Developing Relationships

Most young adults experience changes in their relationships. Existing friendships may deepen, and they may make new friends among a broader mix of people. At the same time, they are reordering the relationships within their family, integrating sexuality into their lives, and choosing a permanent lifestyle such as marriage or a vocation to the priesthood, diaconate, or religious life.

#### Making Friends and Developing Intimacy

During the young adult years, friendships that developed during adolescence often change. Some relationships deepen, others fade. At the same time, new relationships are formed within ethnic communities and around church activities, hobbies, sports, work, or school. Many young adults with small children become friends with parents of other small children through school or community activities, thereby forming small communities for support and information. Some single young adults make friends through the workplace, church, or the health club while others speak of the pain of being alone in a crowd. These young adults, who are not able to surround themselves with friends and family, struggle with much loneliness.

#### Developing Multicultural Relationships

Young adults navigate another new challenge as they develop friendships among people of diverse cultures. Through these experiences, they seek to understand their own culture while becoming sensitive to the many cultures around them. Through these friendships, the barriers that separate culture from culture and create divisions among people can begin to break down. As a result, prejudice and discrimination lessen, and understanding and compassion increase. People can freely and consciously integrate elements of their culture of origin with the culture at large into a new vision that is founded on a coherent system of values and beliefs.

#### Reordering of Relationships within the Family of Origin

The relationships that young adult men and women have with their parents change as they move into a more adult relationship with them. While these changes signal a reordering within the family, it will always be true that "the family and the home are where we learn who we are. It is the family that teaches us much about ourselves. It is the family that is the first school and the first laboratory for the transmission of culture, the passing on of values, the handing down of traditions, the planting of the seed of faith and the proclamation of the Good News." Many young adults who during their adolescence sought independence and a certain distance from parents begin to appreciate them in a new way—as role models, mentors, and friends. Others must come to terms with patterns of destructive family behavior that resulted from substance and other abuses during their childhood and adolescent years. A few young adults even become the economic and emotional support for their parents.

Many young adults struggle with the tension between differences in contemporary culture and the cultural heritage of their families. Young adults from diverse cultures have "distinct and unique perspectives, values and traditions relating to family and family life" that they wish to preserve. Because of the process of acculturation, this can result in struggles between generations over which traditions to keep and which to adapt or combine.

#### Integrating Sexuality into Life

As they engage in and deepen their relationships with others, young adults seek to integrate sexuality into their lives. They seek to discern how their values and religious beliefs should inform their decisions around sexuality. Because of such pervasive practices as nonmarital intercourse, living together outside of

marriage, and sexual abuse, many express concern about how to sustain a positive attitude and Christian wisdom regarding sexuality.

#### Choosing to Marry

During the young adult years, many men and women marry and begin a family. Many newly married couples speak of delaying the start of a family to deepen their relationship, to find work, or to become more financially stable. Some tell us that they value children but wonder about bringing children into a world marked with so much pain and evil. Couples from different cultures face challenges identifying which traditions and customs to follow and deciding how to raise their children. Others are concerned with marital stability in a society where nearly one-half of the marriages end in separation or divorce. They know from the experiences of divorced parents, grandparents, siblings, and friends that this experience is very painful. They approach marriage seriously. Some speak of the challenge of raising children as a single parent. Others share the pain of being separated from full communion with the church community as a result of remarriage or being in relationships not recognized by the Church.

#### The Single Life

Another difference in the lives of young adults today is the number of men and women who remain single throughout their lifetime. For some, this is a conscious decision to focus their lives on their careers or work or to dedicate themselves to others through community service. Others remain single because they do not find compatible spouses. The experience can be very painful, but it can also lead the single person to a greater level of maturity.

Single young adults have very different needs and interests from those who are engaged or married, with or without children. These single men and women work to identify what gives meaning to their lives in a way that is different from those who are married or have a religious vocation. The quest for close friendships and participation in small groups or communities of like people is particularly important. Young adults form these relationships even while realizing that they may be temporary, due to the transient nature of young adult life.
